

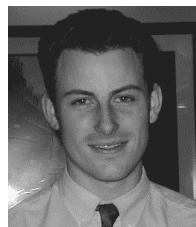

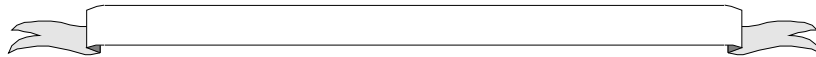

Derek E Sibson's 1000 peals for the Cumberlands

A MIL(L)ESTONE

It all began in 1960 when I went to listen to a handbell peal attempt for Yorkshire S. Major by Joan, Dennis and Peter Beresford and Michael Lakin. Or at least that was what I thought, but when I got there I was persuaded to ring the tenors and call a peal of Grandsire Caters instead! Although not a member of the Society, in those days belfry elections were allowed prior to peals and ratified at the next meeting of the Society and so I became a member and rang my first peal for the Society at the same time.

In the late 50's, the Society was at a low ebb and only had one practise a month on the first Wednesday at St. Martin-in-the-Fields, but when Dennis Beresford became Master, a group of invited ringers attended practises on the other Wednesdays and these subsequently developed into the Society's regular weekly practises. As a result there was not much peal ringing for the Society, indeed in 1960 11 peals were rung, 1961 7, 1962 9, 1963 10, 1964 17 and 1965 14. In the late 50's the annual totals were even lower, with one year only 3 peals being rung. By the end of 1965 I had rung 26 peals for the Society. There was clearly at that period no likelihood of ever ringing a large number of peals for the Society but then things change, and how they have changed! With the first restoration of Shoreditch bells in 1968 peal ringing for the Society increased with 48 peals in 1969, 15 of them at Shoreditch. Over the next 22 years the total remained between 30 and 60 but then in 1990 it rose to the 90's, 143 in 1994, 211 in 1996 and of course 441 in 1997. My own participation remained fairly steady varying from 12 to 35 throughout the 70's and 80's, and it took until early 1993 to reach 500 for the Society. Just under 33 years then for the first 500 but only another seven and a half for the second 500. Undoubtedly this has been due to two factors, firstly, that I became part-time (at the Hospital!) and then we had the 250th anniversary year.

Now for a few statistics in the 1000. As might be expected, the leading tower is Shoreditch with 281, followed by Trumpington (37), St. Martin-in-the-Fields (27) and West Ham (18). In all the peals have been rung at 373 different towers. 479 have been on eight bells, but only 2 triples (one of those being Colin Wyld's bob's only Stedman), 288 on 12 bells (30 of cinques), 221 on 10 bells (6 caters), and 12 of minor. The leading method is Bristol Surprise Major (70) followed by Yorkshire Maximus (54) quite a lot of them with "the one Big Bob, in the third course", and Bristol Maximus (41). 434 different methods have been rung if one includes different numbers of Spliced as a separate method, and the total number of peals of Spliced is 244, in up to 204 methods. There have been 23 different conductors other than myself (849) with Dennis Beresford leading at 66 followed by John Loveless (19) and Graham Duke (10). I am very grateful to Dennis Beresford for all his help and encouragement in my "formative" years in the Society. Of the ringers, 519 have been rung with my wife, Jane, 435 with Peter Fleckney, 306 with Ben Duke, 272 with Alan Regin and 247 with Simon Davies. Altogether 526 members of the Society have been "involved" and I hope many more will be in the future.

I am very grateful to all the members who have rung with me over these forty years and I do look forward to many more peals for the Society. I have been very privileged to have taken part in many memorable performances for the Society and am very grateful for all the invitations to ring and conduct, not least in the 250th Anniversary Year. With the recent upsurge in peal ringing it will not be long before other members reach this total, and it will certainly not have taken them so long to achieve it. The leaders at the time of writing, and with peals so far published in the Ringing World, are Alan Regin (877), Simon Davies (730) and Graham Duke (625) with several others over 500. We look forward to congratulating them in due course.

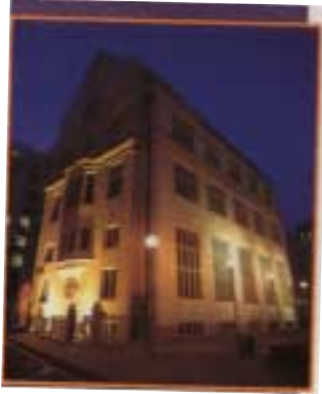

Dinner 2000

At 1:45am on Sunday 10th September I fell into bed and lay awake, contemplating the evening we had just enjoyed. It occurred to me as I awaited the arrival of continuous zz's that ringing has, over the years done so much for me that I can never totally repay the debt. Ringing and ringers have taken me around the world and given me a group of friends I would and could not swap for better. The fellowship of ringers is a priceless commodity and let no-one undervalue it. A perfect example of this was the Millennium Dinner we had attended just a few hours earlier at the Insurance Hall in "our nation's Capital".

For anyone who doesn't know, and I guess that goes for most, the Insurance Hall lies tucked behind the Guildhall in Central London, a short walk from St. Mary-le-Bow. The main hall of this building is a magnificent venue for a formal dinner with its fine panelling and large stained glass windows containing the coats of arms of many of the countries oldest Insurance companies.



The evening began well for me by meeting two of my closest and oldest friends, neither of whom I now see regularly. What better way to start off the evening than by sipping champagne and chatting over old and new times. Around the room many others were doing the same.

At the appointed hour we progressed to the main hall for dinner. Large functions like this are often marred by poor service and cold vegetables, or even cold service and poor vegetables! This

event was however a shining example of how to provide an excellent meal for a hundred people. Service was polite, attentive and speedy and the food as good as one could wish for. The choice of round tables for 10 produced a good atmosphere of intimacy and conviviality among a large number and lead to lively conversation. For those with the need for



culinary detail, we dined upon Thai Salmon, Rack of Lamb and Lemon Tart.

The dining over, we were treated to a fine quartet of speeches, preceded by three leads of Kent Royal rung by Pat Newton, Jenny Town, John Loveless, Paul Cammiade and The

Master.

Ron Warford rose to announce himself to the assembled company as the "most ungodly" of men, and therefore an odd choice to propose a toast to the Church. Ron spoke impressively without notes and with a relaxed air of informality which was enjoyed by everyone.

Responding to the toast, Revd Stephen Nicholson regaled us with a speech which was obviously sponsored by a well-known bellfoundry. It contained a number of references to a "Taylor-built 220 volt AC single phase supply roll-player and keyboard console". Not only a good advert but a good way to use up five minutes of speech-making!



Chris Kippin proposed the toast to the Society and detailed the results of his researches into use of the Cumberland epithet. Audible gasps were to be heard on hearing the Hon. Sec. described as the "Cumberland Sausage". Gasps of admiration for Chris' bravery obviously.

Finally, the Master. Ian/Glint treated us to a brief statistical analysis of the previous year's activity but this was eclipsed by what was to follow.

On the morning of the Dinner Derek Sibson had been successful in ringing his 1000th peal for the Society (at St. Martins in the Fields) and Glint presented Derek with a framed "peal board" recording the details.

I am always in admiration of people in whom a fire of enthusiasm for their chosen activities/hobbies/sports remains alight over long periods. This is so obviously true of Derek and the generous applause at this presentation accurately reflected the high regard in which he is held. Well done Derek!

This concluded the evening's formal activities and the rest of the evening seemed to pass all too quickly as old and new friends enjoyed a chance to socialise together.



My thanks must go to all who were involved in organising the Millennium Dinner, another highlight in the Society's history. In my view one of the best formal dinners I have attended. Thank you from all of us who benefited from your efforts.

National 12 Bell Striking Competition

Being the newest member of the band for the 12-bell final, the task of reporting on the events of the day has fallen to me. Looking back on the event several weeks/months later, I must confess that having never taken part in a striking competition on such a scale, I felt a little like I had just stepped off the plane at Heathrow!!! In spite of this, I hope this report is accurate and I apologise now for any errors.

Having won our eliminator at Towcester and venturing to Birmingham the previous Sunday for a practice, the band duly assembled at St Phillips for the final (even if it required catching a lift with one of the judges). The contrast between the two days could not have been more marked. Apart from considerably more people being around at the final (actually only a few more, members of the home team were sitting on the roof of the Cathedral during our practice), the weather for the practice had made the correspondent feel more like he was ringing in Sydney than the Midlands. Even more surprising was that we were greeted on the Saturday by a member of the Society more famous for carrying pints of Cider carrying fairy cakes instead!!!!

Major works to the grounds around the Cathedral prevented anyone sitting outside to listen, so after the announcement of the draw, we were forced to make an early appearance at the designated pub for the day. However, this rather unusual circumstance did not seem to bother those participating or supporting in the slightest!!! Could this be taken to mean that ringers actually prefer to spend more time in public houses than ringing?? Surely not!!!

Having been drawn to ring fourth, the band regrouped at the bottom of the tower at the appointed hour. I have read in previous reports and heard from members of previous bands that it has become custom to have the "this is the most

important 15 minutes of your life” speech prior to the commencement of the test piece. Well, that might be the most important but the time between waiting at the bottom of the tower and entering the ringing room was certainly the **longest** 15 minutes!!! Nerves aside, we took up our appointed positions and commenced our practice. Whilst the waiting to ring seemed to drag on, the practice time seemed remarkably short, and after a slight twist to the aforementioned customary speech by Alan the test piece began. The ringing settled quickly, and the changes rolled by with little hesitation, prompting even the judges to make particular mention of the middle section round the before lead. A hiccup in the last half lead (which was rectified very quickly) was the only really noticeable error during the performance. All that was left now was to await the judges’ decision, and to find out what the pundits in the churchyard thought.

After a period of limbo and alcohol consumption, all the interested parties reassembled for the verdict on the day’s proceedings. The 12 Bell committee Chairman made a short speech during which he thanked the Society’s Treasurer, Heather Kippin, for her efforts over the past 5 years as competition Secretary. Heather had chosen to stand down after this year’s competition and another member of the Society, Carol Franklin, had agreed to take over. We wish her well in her new post. The Chief judge for the competition then took the podium to give judge’s overall comments.

As many members will know, these comments did spark a lot of controversy subsequent to the competition, which I will not rake over. Suffice to say that whilst the spirit of the words may have been accurate, it was the actual phrasing which left a somewhat sour taste in some people’s mouths. It was then left to the other judges to make specific comments and announce the order of the bands. Somewhat surprisingly we were placed 4th with 58%. As with the previous year, the home team took the Trophy with 88%, a considerable margin over the rest of the

teams. Our congratulations go to the Birmingham band and also to the St Martin in the Fields band who came 3rd.

Next year the final will be held at South Petherton on 30 June. The Society has also recently been drawn to ring in the Eliminator at Newport, Gwent on 24 March. Why not come along and support the Society and enjoy listening to some of the best 12-bell ringing in the country.

Country Meetings

COUNTRY MEETING IN SUSSEX

It's by no means a new phenomenon for the Society to venture into the wilds of Sussex. Ever since Thomas Lintott of Horsham travelled up to St. Mary's, Whitechapel in February 1775 to ring a peal with the Cumberlands, has there been a link between the county and the Society. (Interestingly there are still Lintotts living in both Horsham and Warnham.)

This visit was repaid the following year when a peal of Bob Major was rung for the Society at Horsham, called by George Gross. In 1779 both Gross and Lintott were involved in a peal of 11088 Bob Major at St. Nicholas', Brighton. This and indeed many of the early peals rung in Sussex were credited to the Cumberlands.

Nearly 200 years later one of the early ventures of the Society in the modern era was an informal gathering in the county on July 27th, 1974, with three peals being rung – at Burwash, Easebourne and Petworth – and general ringing around Horsham, before an evening event at the Angel Hotel, Petworth.

It was therefore quite appropriate that another visit should

take place for the County Meeting on March 11th this year. On this occasion seven peals were rung – at Arundel, St. Nicholas' Brighton, Horsham, Lewes, Petworth, Withyham and Chiswick (!). Clearly the latter band approached the idea of taking the country air with some reticence. They need not have worried as brilliant sunshine welcomed the 80 or so members taking part during the day.

General ringing took place during the afternoon on the eights at Billingshurst and Rudgwick and on the recently augmented ten at Warnham. After refreshments in the Warnham Church Room the business meeting was held in the church, when six new members were elected. The company then made their way to Warnham Village Hall where Ian and Margaret Oram and the Warnham ringers had laid on a sumptuous supper to be enjoyed by all.

JULY COUNTRY MEETING TO LEICESTER

Peal bands trickled into the area early on Thursday to join locals in six successful peal attempts in the area. Friday's peal count was six out of seven and we give many thanks to Alan Regin for organising these attempts, only one of which was lost.

On both Thursday and Friday there were practise nights to join – at Leicester Cathedral and St Margaret's Leicester respectively. The numbers at these were swelled by new arrivals and those not exhausted by peals, post peal refreshments or driving.

The Joiner's Arms was heaving on Friday night as more ringers joined the throng which now numbered 100, including a busload from the north, fresh from a peal success en route. Some who didn't partake in pub food or takeaway Chinese reportedly visited and revisited at least one excellent curry house.

So of course the inevitable scrambling for lifts and early starts was not without its pain on Saturday morning – it's always too early after a Friday night meeting old friends and new....Anyway Saturday's ringing was a mix of general ringing and six successful peal attempts.

We all converged on St Margaret's in the afternoon, where most of the crowd managed to grab a post wedding ring and then partake in pre meeting tea and cake, whilst watching the men struggle with logs on the barbeque in preparation for the evening's meal.

But before we could sate our appetites we had the meeting to attend. Once again it was in an attractive and comfortable setting (who said church pews were uncomfortable) and was chaired in an excellent fashion by our Master. Four new members were elected, Derek Sibson gave a report on Central Council and we finally made a decision against the Library at Shoreditch. (Many thanks go to all who have put in such time and effort regarding this and to those who were willing to contribute fiscally.) The discussions were sometimes lively and nearly all relevant and interesting – I always expect to be bored by meetings but I am often pleasantly surprised by SRCY ones!

Appreciation also must be given to Ian Fielding, our Master, who chaired the meeting so smoothly and arranged peals on Saturday and Sunday. Finally, the members give big thank you to the Leicester ringers for organising such a successful and enjoyable occasion.

Once at Limehouse Station it was another dash to the church, a quick visit to the loo's which actually seemed miles away from the tower and it was time to start the second peal. Then reality struck me – not only was I going to have to ring again for at least 3 hours but that I had been prised off the treble and the brain was going to have to do some work. Knees went very wobbly and before we even pulled off I could feel my hands getting sore. But 3 hours later a peal of London Major was scored – as soon as we stopped ringing Russell kindly shoved a chair behind me before the knees finally gave way.

At last we could join everyone else in the 'Pride' and a few welcome pints of London Pride was downed, probably too quickly! Then it was time to go to the Sheraz and eat too much of their delicious food. There was a quiz – match the dedication to the tower – Alan won with only one wrong, which of course had to be the only one I'd answered! The day was summed up by Glint – 9 peals attempted and 9 scored – and thanks were sent to those who done the organising and of course to the Sheraz for the wonderful food. Total exhaustion then set in for me and I could just about stagger to the Pride for after dinner drinkies.

Summing up, it was a good day, with lots of laughs and I did feel chuffed that I'd done it, despite aching all over for the next week. Did it put me off peal ringing? Well, put it this way, I've barely touched a bell rope since!!

Sunday service ringing has increased with the temporary

cessation of Sunday ringing at Shoreditch and we now ring on the 1st and 3rd Sundays when we are able. We remain very reliant on a very small number of ringers who regularly support Sunday service ringing. Further problems has been caused by the move of service time at St Martin-in-the-Fields from 9.45 to 10.00 restricting the amount of time that we have to ring at Spitalfields.

We have continued to ring for both the Summer and Winter Music festivals; before the first and last concert during both festivals and before the Parish Carol concert during the Winter festival.

The restoration of the Church continues, the outside of the Church is now almost complete, just take a look from the South west corner standing on Commercial Street - stunning! Work on the interior is due to start again during 2001.

SRCY NORTHERN PRACTICES THE STORY SO FAR

The story really begins with Duncan Walker, as he organised 12 bell practices at Stockton with the idea of encouraging 12 bell ringing in an area where there was none. These were well-supported at first, but lost impetus with other activities taking over, and possibly also because of increasing expertise in Surprise Maximus ringing at Newcastle Cathedral.

Meanwhile, the Cumberlands were growing in strength in the north-east, mainly due to Ron's encouragement, which led to Ron handing out a questionnaire asking for support to attend the Country meeting at Wisbech, and mentioning the possibility of a Northern Cumberlands practice. Quite separately from this I had decided to try to reinstate the Stockton practices, as I was missing the opportunity to ring on 12 (there were NO rings of 12 in North Yorkshire at the time). When I realised that 90% of the people I was contacting were Cumberlands, the two ideas gelled and the Northern Practice was born.

We held the first practice in April 1999 and to date there have been eight, all at Stockton. We have never met with less than 18 ringers, the maximum being 25, and we have always encouraged non-members to attend. At first attendance was from North Yorkshire and the "Durham and Newcastle" Association, but then Andrew Sibson starting making the long trek across the Pennines, bringing members from Leeds with him.

Bristol Maximus has been rung at all the practices, and is usually the best ringing ; strangely Stedman is usually the worst, but this could be partly because of Tyneside tradition of ringing more Maximus than Cinques! We encourage less experienced 12 bell ringers by ringing quite a lot of "right-place" S. Maximus, and have included Newgate as a stepping stone to more challenging methods. The atmosphere up the tower is informal – we all have a lot of fun, which can come as a bit of a shock

to newcomers, but once the ringing starts everyone is trying their best. Afterwards, in the Sun Inn (best Bass in the North of England according to my husband, and he should know!), the quality of the comradeship and the beer has to be experienced to be believed.

Future plans include a practice at Ripon Cathedral, and a 12-bell outing next January, organised by Matt Durham. We are going to include Orion as the special method for the next practice, otherwise things will remain very much as they are. Why tamper with success?

Peals, 250 years ago:

01/02/1751 Christ Church Spitalfields 5040 Plain Bob Major 3:48 George Partrick

This was the only peal rung by the Society in that year, the ninth for the Society since its formation. This was on the heavy, 44cwt, 8, Robert Wight ringing the tenor single handed. The next peal was rung in July 1752, and quite an important one it was as well, wait till next year and you will find out where.

Bands in this year included the famous Malachi Channon and Thomas Reeves. It appears that 1801 also marked the handover of conducting duties from George Gross senior to George Gross junior. Gross senior went on to conduct only one more peal for the Society in February 1803, fittingly at Shoreditch, where many of his peals had been rung. He died on 5th May 1803.

Some interestingly named methods, the Hackney peal states "The Society rang a true peal of triples 5040 on a new principal that reverses the present system of ringing by dodging in 3 hours 46 minutes without a dodge. The principal of this peal being by place making and is the first peal rang (sic) in the method on any number of bells. The Society to commemorate the union of Great Britain and Ireland entitled it Cumberland Imperial Place Triples. Composed and called by William Shipway without a single. The author of this system of ringing".

For the Court Bob Royal peal the copy peal book states "Being the first ever rung by any Society in that intricate method".

The footnote to the Hemel Hempstead peal records "Being the first peal ever rang on those bells and the bells going so bad was obliged to have nine men". Thomas Padgett and George Gross senior ringing the tenor!

The Spitalfields peal was rung after the augmentation to ten before they were augmented to twelve.(The first peal on the 12 was rung in 1804).

These four rang some of the early handbell peals of Surprise Major including Superlative in 1901, New Cambridge in 1902, London in 1904 and Bristol in 1907.

Another very well know ringer was William Fussell from Slough who was one of the early 1000 peelers.

The Kent band was still pretty active under the leadership of Thomas Card.

Society of Royal Cumberland Youths
Officers' Report 1999 – 2000

The Society entered the new Millennium with a great deal of activity – wide participation in the Ring in 2000 project, growing involvement and enthusiasm of the membership out of London, steadily increasing peal ringing activity and the healthy attendance at meetings and practices all reflecting the current strength of the Society.

Practices and Meetings

Forty six practices were held in London during the year, with an average attendance of 23. Methods have ranged from Cambridge and Stedman up to Orion. Out of town practices at St. John's, Croydon, Chelmsford Cathedral and Great St Mary, Cambridge were well supported by regulars and it was particularly encouraging to see so many members not usually able to attend central London practices.

Northern practices, mainly at Stockton-on-Tees, have been held on an almost monthly basis, with attendances between 18 and 25, and methods regularly including Bristol and Newgate Maximus.

Midlands Practices have continued. Monthly quarters have been attempted, with methods including London S. Royal and Cambridge and Yorkshire S. Maximus being rung at a variety of different towers.

Five General Meetings of the Society were held during the year, of which three were in London – two at St. Martin-in-the-Fields and one at The Owl and the Pussycat, Shoreditch. An extremely enjoyable Country Meeting was held at Warnham, Sussex in March, attended by over 70 members. The now customary peals, general ringing and business meeting were followed by an excellent supper. The July Country Meeting has certainly become one of the highlights of the calendar, having evolved into a long weekend. This year's meeting, based in Leicester, was certainly no exception. Over 100 members participated in peals, general ringing and a barbecue, and had a thoroughly enjoyable time. A great deal of hard work went into making both Country Meetings such a success, and we are extremely grateful to everyone who was involved in their organisation.

Other Events

The Society's year began in September with a peal day on 9/9/99. Fittingly, 9 peals of 9 methods were scored. This was closely followed two days later by another extremely enjoyable informal dinner at the Hop Cellars to celebrate the 252nd anniversary weekend, attended by 64 members and friends.

A substantial donation from the sale of the Oranges and Lemons prints has been made to the Bell Restoration Fund, and we thank those involved. In September, the Society was represented by the Master and Junior Steward at a presentation of a framed print to the Lord Mayor of London in the ringing room at Bow.

Over 250 members took part in another very successful peal weekend in November. 37 peals were scored out of a total of 55 attempted, almost equalling the previous record of 38 set prior to the 250th anniversary year..

Not the Dinner Day has now become a fixture on the calendar on the first Saturday in February. Nine peals were rung and about 50 members and friends enjoyed an excellent curry at the Sheraz.

Having won our eliminator at Towcester, the Society's band came 4th in the final of the National Twelve Bell Contest, held at Birmingham Cathedral in July.

The Society continues to raise its profile in the States, with a number of members participating in successful peal and teaching tours.

We thank the many members who have helped to organise these events.

Peal ringing

The new record of 252 peals reported last year has been short lived! Increasing enthusiasm and wide involvement in peal ringing continues, with a remarkable total of 294 peals being rung. Following the change to the Society's year end,

this has been achieved in only 11 months!

New members

We welcome the 25 new members elected to the Society this year.

Towers

St Martin-in-the-Fields continues to be the regular venue for practices on the first Wednesday of each month. Routine maintenance on the bells and the repair of the floor underneath the tenor has taken place during the course of the year, and the clock is currently undergoing repair.

The major church restoration project at Shoreditch has now begun. The Society is actively involved, with representation on the project steering group. Access for ringing will still be maintained throughout the closure of the church. Several reports containing recommendations to improve the go and acoustics of the bells at Shoreditch have now been received, and a working group has been set up to discuss how we move forward on this.

Spitalfields has continued to be a very active tower despite the major restoration which is continuing at the Church. A large number of peals have been rung in the past year. As usual we rang for the Spitalfields Festival, a peal to celebrate the start of the Festival and ringing before the first and last concerts. We also rang for the Winter Festival which occurs in the weeks leading up to Christmas. Minor maintenance has been done on the bells. During the year we purchased a new set of ropes, in the SRCY colours of burgundy and cream, and a new set of muffles.

In September a peal was rung to welcome the Venerable Lyle Dennan, the new Archdeacon of Hackney, to St Andrew's, Holborn.

Sunday Service Ringing

A number of Society members are part of the local band at St Martin-in-the-Fields, ringing for two services each Sunday. All Sunday ringing at Shoreditch has temporarily ceased following the closure of St Leonards for restoration.

Ringling for service continues at Spitalfields. This has increased to twice a month, on the 1st and 3rd Sundays, since February when Church closure at Shoreditch stopped ringing there. We are very grateful to members of the St Martin-in-the-Fields band and other members who loyally continue to support the Sunday Service ringing at the Society's towers.

Newsletter

The newsletter is our only means of communication with the whole membership, and contributions are always welcomed by our editor. Last year's newsletter was published on the website as well as being sent out to each member. We are very grateful for the generous donations made by some members. The website, which can be found on www.srcy.org.uk, continues to provide a useful source of information.

Library

The Library has had a higher profile than normal during the past year due to the project to make use of facilities offered to the society within the Restoration of Shoreditch church. At the end of last year, the officers climbed a ladder to peer into the room earmarked as the library room. We had been provided with plans and costings for this project and while the original figure appeared to offer us a London base within a reasonable budget further investigation was to prove otherwise.

The officers mailed the membership to ask for pledges towards the cost of the work and the reponse to this was very encouraging.

In February Nicholas Morgan and Rev Paul Turp attended a Society meeting and this highlighted two major concerns. The time limit on the agreement between the Church and the Society meant that there was no guarantee of the society retaining use of the room in the long term. The second concern was that the cost of the project had escalated significantly since it was originally proposed and there was no guarantee that there would not be further increases. At the Society meeting in July the matter was put to the vote and rejected by a majority of the members present. We are now investigating alternative options to make the Society's library more available to the members.

The Society is again grateful for the annual gift of the Ringing World.

Society Property

We thank the trustees who continue to be actively involved in the safekeeping of the Society's property, stored at St. Martin-in-the Fields.

Monday, across the border to Toronto. Those arriving early enough visited the CN Tower before the practice. It was good to see how well the Toronto band are progressing and we hope that we were able to add something to the practice. We joined the Toronto ringers in the pub where Derek Sawyer seems to have got the ordering and paying for food and drink down to a fine art.

Tuesday saw a peal of Cambridge Maximus with two Toronto ringers Nick Cheeseman and Robin Clarke. A first of maximus for Nick. Having rung many peals on the new bells at Bermondsey, it was good for us to ring one on the old bells in their new home.

Wednesday, a peal of Yorkshire Maximus with Derek Sawyer. Derek Sibson bringing out Frank Blagroves "Big Bob" composition for a much needed airing after such a long rest. After the peal we all raced off to Niagara to view the falls in their winter flow of 34 million gallons a minute.
