# Society of Royal Cumberland Youths Officers' Report 2001-2002

The Society has had another active and successful year. Membership has continued to increase steadily and practices and meetings have been well supported. Attendance at social events has varied with events outside of London proving more popular than those in the capital. It has also been a year of preparation with preliminary plans in hand for work at Shoreditch and the anniversary dinner.

#### **Practices and Meetings**

**London Meetings** 

Regular weekly practices were held in London. The highest attended practice was 30 members at St Martin's on 6th February closely followed by the practice at St Martins on 9<sup>th</sup> January with 29 attendees. There were also two special practices held where quarter peals were rung. (Bristol Maximus and Cambridge Royal). Methods rung at 12 bell practices have included Stedman, Cambridge, Newgate, Yorkshire, Bristol, Orion and Spliced, while at other practices included 8 spliced Royal and touches of methods from Norman Smith's 23 Spliced Surprise Major series. A regional practice was also held at Hertford in February.

Northern Practices

During the year 8 northern practices have been held including one associated with a "Christmas Dinner" in Darlington. Attendance varies but are still generally good. We have lost a few experienced ringers and gained a few less experienced ones so the method range has become more basic, but we are gradually building up again and all practices seem worthwhile. A significant achievement was 2 peals of Orion, one at Escrick with 4 "firsts" and the one at Rotherham had 2 "firsts" in method.

Visitors are always very welcome at any of the Society's practices.

Five business meetings were planned for the year – the A.G.M. in October and four other General Meetings. Meetings were held in London in January and May and Country Meetings were held in Canterbury in March and North Somerset in July. The Spring Country meeting included Peal attempts in all corners of the County of Kent followed by a meeting and evening social in Canterbury. As usual, the possibility of a long weekend ringing was too tempting for a number of members and the July Country meeting included a number of peal attempts on Thursday and Friday, followed by peals and general ringing on Saturday morning. Over 50 members enjoyed a selection of towers on Saturday morning before everyone gathered at Backwell for the meeting. In the evening over 90 members enjoyed an excellent barn dance and supper at Kingston Seymour.

The Society is extremely grateful to everyone who helped organise all of these events.

On 21<sup>st</sup> November 2001, a Special General Meeting was held to consider the reports received on the bells and installation at Shoreditch. From this meeting a set of proposals were agreed and the interested parties invited to provide quotations for the work by the end of January. These were considered at the March Meeting and it was agreed that based on the recommendations of the Shoreditch working party, the contract should be awarded to Hayward Mills.

### Other Events

The Anniversary Dinner was held at the Crypt in St Martins in the Fields on September 8<sup>th</sup> 2001. Over 40 members and friends attended and the evening was enjoyed by all who attended.

Peal weekend took place as usual on the third weekend in November. In total 50 attempts were arranged, of which 38 were successful, and 1 peal was rung for the Norwich Association. Our thanks go to all the organisers of the peals during the weekend and to John Barnes for his patience and commitment to this fixture.

Not the Dinner Day in February followed the usual format with 7 peals being rung during the day and an excellent curry in the evening.

The Society entered a band for the National 12 bell striking competition and after successfully competing in the eliminator at Newcastle were placed third in the final at Winchester in June. It is a credit to the Society that 75% of the members of the bands in the top 3 places were Cumberlands.

Members were active during the year for the funerals of HM Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother and HRH Princess Margaret, and also the Queens Golden Jubilee celebrations both in London and in supporting their local towers throughout the country.

### Peal Ringing

267 peals were rung during the year.

#### New Members

16 new members were elected to the Society during the year. We welcome them.

### Sunday Service Ringing

We are grateful to all members who support the Society's Sunday service ringing.

A number of members are part of the local band at St. Martin-in-the-Fields and ring regularly on Sunday mornings.

The Society is also responsible for regular service ringing at Spitalfields and Shoreditch. It has become increasingly difficult to organise Sunday service ringing at Shoreditch, due to changes in the times of services at St Martin-in-the-Fields. The officers have investigated alternative arrangements for arranging ringing and are grateful to Derek Sibson and Penny Sharpe for their assistance in this matter. Sunday service ringing at Spitalfields has continued when possible.

#### Towers

Regular Society practices continue to be held at St Martin-in-the-Fields, usually on the first Wednesday of each month and we have now returned to Shoreditch on a regular basis for practices.

The work on the Church at Shoreditch has mainly been completed, though the officers are in negotiation with the church about renovation work on the steps to the ringing chamber.

The restoration work at Spitalfields Church continues. The bells are rung regularly and the Society again rang as part of the Spitalfields festival.

Though, since it is a Guild Church, there are usually no Sunday services at St Andrew's, Holborn, the Society is from time to time asked to provide ringing for weekday occasions.

### Newsletter

This year the newsletter has again been published on the website as well as being sent out to every member. This year for the first time the newsletter was produced in A4 format rather than A5. This appears to be popular with the members as the donations we received showed a significant increase over

past years, contributing to nearly half the cost of production. Donations to the cost of producing the newsletter are always very welcome.

### Christmas Cards

Christmas cards based on the Oranges and Lemons prints were produced and sold, in collaboration with the ASCY, with the funds raised towards the BRF. To date this, together with sales for the original prints have raised over £9000. The Society is grateful to Alan Regin, David Hilling and Jo Dorling for the time and effort they have given to this project.

### Library

The programme of transferring historic records belonging to the society to the Guildhall Library has begun. All the volumes of peals books that were stored at St. Martin-in-the-Fields have now been removed and are in the process of being electronically scanned prior to being stored in the Guildhall Library. The task of updating the library records with references to each individual item's location has begun.

When June finally came around, the 22<sup>nd</sup> to be precise, we all wondered why we'd said 'yes' but we dutifully boarded the train to Winchester to represent the Society in the 12-bell competition. It is an occasion that attracts many ringers from all over the country and, whether you are taking part in the competition or not, it certainly is quite different from local events. It is not only a good opportunity to hear good ringing but also a chance to meet old friends – all the more enjoyable when you've already rung your test piece! There is inevitably lots of nervous tension amongst the participants and an abundance of churchyard punditry - and this year was no exception.

For those who haven't been to a 12-bell final before, and I've only been to 4, the successful formula seems to be roughly the same wherever you go – a ring of twelve that you can hear inside and out, lots of space around for milling about and listening and chatting and a very well-stocked beer tent. Winchester fulfilled all the criteria (and the weather was good, too). The local ringers certainly know how to stage an event and we all enjoyed the benefits of some excellent organisation.

So to the actual ringing. The test piece this year was a lead of Primrose followed by five leads of Cambridge maximus, which we had been practicing during the previous months with varying degrees of success. We had qualified for the final at Newcastle earlier in the year, but inevitably, nerves play a large part on the day and our last place in the draw meant a lengthy wait. However, statistics show that a position later in the draw gives an advantage so maybe it was worth it! By the time it was our turn to ring, everyone appeared composed and we all tried our best. There were three members of the band who had never rung in a final before and all credit to them for keeping their cool. It's not bell ringing as we know it!! At the end, we felt we had done pretty well, but not well enough to win, and it turned out that the judges agreed with us.

The results were announced (much later) by the judges, Chris Kippin, Martin Whiteley and Alison Regan and it was clear that their task had not been easy. There were only three percentage points separating the top three teams, but most agreed that York were worthy winners. Much debate and post-mortem ensued, but most people just headed straight back to the beer tent to round off the day in typical style.

Some of you may have heard that Mike Wigney was seriously injured in a climbing accident in the Alps not long after the 12 bell final. We are pleased to report that he is making progress – he is now coming home at weekends, is ringing handbells and is also hoping that he will be able to come to the dinner in Cambridge in September.

We send our best wishes to him.

### Newcastle Practice on 27 November 2002 - a visitor's impression

### From the Peal Books

The peal at Romford (the dedication is how it appears in the copy peal book) was the first peal rung there and was the 17th rung for the Society, George Partrick had called all but one of these.

The peal of Cumberland Bob Major, composed by George Partrick has plain lead shown in the copy peal book, the notation is as follows:

x18x16x58x18x18x18x18x12

Sounds like a good anniversary to commemorate to me!

Don Morrison writes on the subject:

The method would appear to be a sort of reverse of Eastern Bob Major, an asymmetric plain method appearing in the CC methods collections, with the note that it was first rung on 27.12.1747 at Shoreditch. Looking at the Felstead collection it would appear it was rung by the Eastern Scholars. The place notation of Eastern Bob is given as x4x3x1x1x1x1x2 and it is also a leadhead b method. Double Eastern Bob was rung at St Margaret, Westminster five years later. So this similar method being rung at Shoreditch the year after that seems to fit just fine.

The peal at Bow was on the old heavy ten, tenor around 53cwt and it is noted that it was "rang by ten men only", James Marlton ringing the tenor.

In the copy peal book it is recorded after the Shoreditch peal recorded that "on the 3rd May this year died Mr George Gross senr who had served the Society as their Warner more than 20 years and by his abilities as a composer and bob caller caused the fame of this Society to be extended through these Kingdoms his compositions in this art are held in the highest estimation by all admirers of this exercise but more especially his productions in Treble Bob in which he surpassed all his contemporaries which will ever remain a lasting monument of the skill. He was succeeded in the Office of Warner by his only Son Mr George Gross."



### St. Martin-in-the-Fields

The St Martins band has had a successful and enjoyable year with much activity to report on.

At the AGM in February 2002, Olly Cross was re-elected as Tower Captain whilst Fiona Edwards took up the role of Vice Captain and Joanne Fielding as Secretary. Some members have been lost from the Sunday service band as natural turnover dictates members move out of London or towards other towers. Despite the loss of some strong members, the band has continued to ring Bristol Maximus and Stedman Cinques as standard on a Sunday morning, with Orion not quite as frequent, but nevertheless a part of the band's repertoire.

Advancement continues to be a strong theme at St Martins, both as a band and as individuals. In 2002 a peal of Orion was rung, followed by a peal of Stedman Cinques in June for the Queen's Golden Jubilee. Several quarter peals have been arranged and rung specifically to help individuals in their learning of a new method.

In June 2002, the band made no secret of their delight at the result of the National Twelve Bell Striking Competition in Winchester. Just 1% behind the winners, this was a great day for the band, and, incidentally, 11 of the 12 are members of the SRCY. The individuals who rang have much to celebrate, but it's not just down to the 12 that this result was achieved. Those who were willing to help with the practices played a large part, as did the church in their support and encouragement of what is still considered a relatively new band to the 12 bell.

During the summer months the church organised some hidden tours which took visitors behind the scenes into the vestry, roof space and ringing room. This presented an opportunity to experience a different part of ringing, that of communicating our art to the outside world. Roddy Horton worked with the church to plan the ringing room part of the tour, which was to turn out the high point for many visitors. It's difficult to put all you know about ringing into a 10-minute slot, but somehow Roddy, Tony Kench, Alan Regin, Terry Horton, Jo Dorling and Jo Fielding achieved this with many complimentary comments from both the church and the visitors.

Looking back over the year, the band has much to be proud of. Looking forward, there are new and exciting opportunities that will arise. We look to continue to advance our ringing, both as individuals and as a band, and to contribute more than a 'Sunday morning noise' to church life. ### **Spitalfields**

As members will probably be aware, the church restoration project at Spitalfields moves ahead, the exterior work being completed some while ago. We have been aware for some while that the interior work is planned to start shortly. In fact, it is understood that the contractors will take over the building on Monday 4th November. It is quite likely, because of the regular access route through the Church, that we will not be able to gain access to the ringing chamber for some while. We hope to meet with the contractors shortly to discuss the situation, I will endeavour to keep members aware of developments in this respect.

Although the work may restrict ringing in the short term, I am certain that the long term benefits will very great. On a sad note, I have to report the departure of the Rev Paul Bowtell after over 11 years at Spitalfields. He is moving to a new post in East London. Paul has been a great friend to ringers in general and the Society in particular and he will be greatly missed.

#### **AUSTEN WILLIAMS 1912-2001**

Prebendary Austen Williams was the first person to be elected an Honorary Member of the Society after the rules were amended to allow non-ringers who have been particularly supportive of the Society to be elected. He felt very honoured to be in such a position.

Austen was vicar of St Martin-in-the-Fields for 28 years - from 1956 until his retirement in 1984 and he followed the Rev. Mervyn Charles Edwards when he became Bishop of Worcester. He was an ideal priest for St Martins with his very individual approach to the part St Martins played in caring for the lonely, unwanted and homeless, in the tradition established by Dick Sheppard. He was also a very well known and loved broadcaster with a monthly service for the BBC World Service and the Annual Christmas Appeal as well as early morning slots.

He was a very loyal supporter of the Society, even though he felt the priorities at the time prevented him launching an appeal for the bells, while recognising their need for restoration. He was a regular guest at the Society's dinners and we have enjoyed his speeches on a number of occasions.

He died in December 2001 at the age of 89 and we shall miss his quiet spoken help and advice as will numerous others who have benefited from St Martins.

### **Excellent Team-work at Liverpool Cathedral**

A Cumberland band rang the first peal of Bristol Surprise Maximus on the 82 cwt bells of Liverpool Cathedral. This took place on Saturday June 1<sup>st</sup> and was rung to celebrate the Queen's Golden Jubilee.

Congratulations to the whole band for a great performance.

Here we have reports from each ringer describing how it felt to be part of what has been universally recognised as a brilliant achievement.

Bell by bell:

### **Christina Fleckney - Treble**

Having lived on Merseyside most of my life ringing at Liverpool Cathedral was not uncommon, but even for general ringing there was a "fear" - the vastness of the Cathedral, the claustrophobic lifts, the cavernous ringing chamber, the circus ring with sawdust, the sound of the bells - and now a peal to be rung. I've no idea where the time went as it seemed shorter than most other peals and it took the rest of the day for the reality of the excellent performance to sink in. An ambition fulfilled in style. Thanks to all involved.

#### **Catherine Merlane - 2**

To ring a peal at Liverpool Cathedral was something I had placed on the 'unlikely to do' list so I felt extremely honoured to be invited to ring for the Queen's Golden Jubilee. My fears of standing on the wooden ring were overcome at the practice but the other worry was 'how do I know how far through the peal we are?' So the composition was learnt in an unconventional manner but this made it easier to gauge progress. Driving home I was on a high, proud that I had been part of the team that had achieved what we had set out to do. For me it was certainly the highlight of the year.

### **Linda Garton - 3**

An unforgettable day! I don't think I've ever been so nervous during a peal or quite so jubilant afterwards! It was a brilliant team effort, resulting in a peal to be really proud of. The ringing was confident and positive from the start - the practice beforehand was certainly invaluable. My lasting memory will be of everyone running round and round the ring after the peal, congratulating each other, and when we went up to look at the bells, the magnitude of the achievement really sank in.

### Ian Roulstone - 4 Conductor

My lasting impression of the peal at Liverpool will be one of a fine, solid, team effort. From the moment we set foot inside the ringing chamber for the practice on 19th May, everyone geared themselves up for a real challenge. And somehow, I felt that all the band realised the importance of simply giving our best - if the bells turned out to be too much, then we would have tried our hardest. Standing on the `circus ring' and ringing Bristol Maximus on an 82cwt twelve was just dealt with. In the end it was SRCY 1, '82cwt twelve' 0!

### Claire Edwards - 5

A certainly memorable - if not slightly stressful - experience. It's probably the first and maybe the last peal I've rung in where one ringer has made a grab for another ringers vittles. (Vittle: archaic variant spelling of victual, meaning food or provisions, typically as prepared for consumption and related to vivere "to live".) And of course I'm very pleased to have been asked to take part.

### **Doug Beaumont - 6**

Everything about the ringing chamber seems calculated to terrify, from the wide echoing chamber with its great steel beams covered in black pitch, to the high circular platform on which ringing takes place. It was a great event to be taking part in, but a relief to finish!

### **Graham Duke - 7**

When Jake first emailed me with the offer of a rope at Liverpool I couldn't reply fast enough, as it really is the opportunity of a lifetime. At the practice a fortnight before I found them just as difficult to hear as I remembered them, even after a few touches, and I felt that we rang rather too slowly and there were too many method mistakes. So for the peal I took some cotton wool to put in my ears and although this quietened everything it did make the strike notes clearer and helped me a lot. I was very pleased with the peal, and think we settled down well in the circumstances, produced good ringing throughout and had an excellent finish.

#### Peter Fleckney - 8

Having been let down once at Liverpool Cathedral I didn't really hold my breath about this one. However after the practice, which proved very useful, it seemed more likely and my enthusiasm returned. On the day the band used all its experience and professionalism to produce a peal which I'm sure none of us will ever forget. A great effort by all.

#### Ian Fielding - 9

The peal went much more quickly than I had expected it to. It wasn't an enjoyable experience in the normal sense of the word, but very satisfying when it came round. The whole band rang well as a band (we wouldn't have got it if we hadn't) and some of the ringing at the end was really enjoyable.

### Stan Jenner - 10

The only thing missing at Liverpool to make the set-up totally intimidating is a long draught, and I have never seen a whole band so nervous before a peal. Once under way, most of the peal was good, but the confident ringing of the last three quarters of an hour or so was a particular pleasure: the tenor ringers knew they had enough left in the tank to finish in style, but the rest of us had to keep up on our own! I'm glad I've done it, but I wouldn't like to have to do it again.

#### Alan Regin - 11

I suppose my main thought was that, as a band, we were stepping into the unknown. Although we were all very experienced peal ringers none of us had rung a peal on such heavy bells and in a place quite like Liverpool Cathedral. Those bells are a physical and mental challenge - the weight of bells, the fact that all ringers stand on what is in effect a very large box in a huge towers surrounded by sound - what an experience!

### John Loveless - Tenor (Box)

I had rung at Liverpool Cathedral several times before and I knew that in terms of both overall difficulty and intimidation rating they were a level above all the other big peals of bells, even including St Paul's. To ring Maximus well (which I felt was an attainable objective from the outset) we clearly needed to take a very strong band but, just as important, we needed a practice session - you really do have to learn how to ring an 82cwt twelve - in order to be fully prepared for the peal. Our first attempt at four extremely slow leads of Bristol demonstrated the steepness of the learning curve but by the end of the practice we had a clear idea of what we needed to do, ring them at a sensible speed and don't be scared! The peal itself? A real team effort, sustained high quality ringing, very few method mistakes and a better result than any of us could have hoped for.

### **Ian Campbell - Tenor (Strap)**

This was a once-only opportunity not to be missed so I was really pumped up for it! However, the strapping was harder work than I had anticipated - that was probably due to the fact that we were always on top of the bell. Bristol is a superb method but to ring it on such heavy bells makes it quite demanding. The end result was I believe exceptional and far surpassed my expectations.

### **Peals Analysis**

This year there has been a slight increase in the number of peals rung between 1/8/01 and 31/7/02, 268 compared with 256 last year. This time there were just 4 (6) handbell peals in that total. The number of towers was almost the same with 184 (187). Once again after just one year being deposed, Shoreditch is back as the leading tower and this year there are three from the U.S.A. in the top ten.

<u>Towers:</u> Shoreditch 18 (11), Spitalfields 10 (13), Trumpington 9 (10), St. Sepulchre's and Barton Seagrave 5 (0 for both), Texarkana 4 (0), Bristol St. Stephen (0), Charleston Cathedral (0), St. Mary-le-Bow (0), Fulbourn (5), Houston (0), Maidstone St. Michael & All Angels (1), Staplehurst (1) and St. Martin-in-the-Fields (2) all 3, 19 towers with 2 and 151 with just 1.

Geographically the peals were even more widespread, being rung in 47 different counties in the British Isles and 24 in 6 states in the U.S.A. Most were rung in London 53 (46), followed this time by Kent 29 (19), Somerset and Avon 24 (6), Cambridgeshire 17 (38) and Essex 12 (6). The change in distribution each year is obviously a reflection of where we hold country meetings and special ringing days.

309 (316) members took part and 141 (155) rang in only one peal.

Ringers: Derek E. Sibson 95 (74), E. Jane Sibson 92 (69), Alan Regin 91 (84), Simon J. Davies 83 (78), Stephen A. Wheeler 66 (55), Christina D. A. Fleckney 60 (43), Ian G. Campbell 59 (46), John P. Loveless 57 (77), Peter M. Fleckney 55 (36), Michael H. D. O'Callaghan 53, (33).

The conducting was shared by 47 people this year compared with 34 last year. Derek E. Sibson 83 (68), Stephen A. Wheeler 43 (38), John P. Loveless 25 (44), Ian R. Fielding 22 (27), James W. Belshaw 13 (10), Ian Roulstone 12 (0), Roger Baldwin 11 (11) and Paul F. Curtis and Ian V. J. Smith 4 each (4 and 0 respectively).

The variety of methods increased again this year having fallen last year. 120 (100) different methods or groups of methods (e.g. 4-Spliced) were rung and it is pleasing to see a marked increase in 12-bell peals after last year, not just due to the return of the availability of Shoreditch.

Methods: Bristol S. Major 24 (40), London S. Major 18 (12), 7 Surprise Minor 15 (15), London No.3 S. Royal 11 (11), 8-Spliced S. Major 10 (8), Glasgow S. Major 9 (4), Yorkshire S. Major 9 (2), 4-Spliced S. Major 7 (12), Bristol S. Maximus 7 (2), Cambridge S. Royal 6 (8) Stedman Cinques 6 (2).

### Results of Peal Weekend 2002

At the time of going to print we know of 41 attempts with 30 peals being scored successfully, 9 losses and 2 peals being rung for local associations.

This year the date of peal weekend seemed to clash with more local events than normal and therefore some areas had difficulty organising bands. One band asked if they could ring a peal the following weekend because of other commitments during peal weekend and we were pleased that they were able to arrange this.
