Society of Royal Cumberland Youths Officers' Report 2002-2003

The Society continues to be active and successful. Membership has increased steadily, especially overseas members and practices and meetings have been well supported. Attendance at social events has shown that the society is active in London and also further afield. This year has also seen to work on the bells at Shoreditch completed and the focus is now to improve the acoustics to provide a first class ring of bells.

Practices and Meetings

London Meetings

Regular weekly practices were held in London. The highest attended practice was 32 members at St Martin's on 7th May and the lowest attended practice was on 16 October at Shoreditch with 12 members present. 83 members attended London Wednesday night practices throughout the year, many of whom travelled long distances to ring. Methods rung at practices ranged from Stedman & Grandsire through to Spliced Surprise Maximus including Rigel & Orion.

Northern Practices

Jennie Town reports that they have held a very successful practice at Newcastle and 3 practices at Stockton. They have introduced Ariel to the practices and successfully pealed both Ariel and Orion with a "north meets south" band in June. They were invited to join the Ripon ringers at their practice in August, and while very few visitors came along, the locals really appreciated the opportunity to ring more than they could usually attempt.

Midlands Practices / Quarter peals

Mick Angrave reports that only two practices were arranged due to difficulties in finding suitable dates. The second practice resulted in a quarter peal of Bristol Major.

Visitors are always very welcome at any of the Society's practices.

Five business meetings were held during the year – the A.G.M. in October and four other General Meetings. Meetings were held in London in January and May and Country Meetings were held in Essex in March and Derby in July. Six peals were scored in towers in Suffolk and Essex while open ringing was centred around Kirby-le-Soken, Following the meeting, a very enjoyable social evening was held with drinks available from the pub opposite. The July country meeting was preceded by a number of peal attempts on the Thursday and Friday before everyone congregated on the Friday evening at the Bridge Inn in Derby. Peals and general ringing followed on Saturday morning followed by the meeting in Belper Church. In the evening a ceilidh was held in St Nicholas church hall in Allestree with a supper of jacket potatoes and salads to help soak up the excellent beer provided.

The Society is extremely grateful to everyone who helped organise all of these events.

Other Events

The Anniversary Dinner, held at the Crypt in St Martin-in-the-Fields on September 7th 2002 was enjoyed by over 40 members and friends.

Peal weekend took place as usual on the third weekend in November. In total 36 attempts were arranged, of which 29 were successful. Our thanks go to all the organisers of the peals during the weekend and to John Barnes for his patience and commitment to this fixture.

Not the Dinner Day in February followed the usual format with 5 peals being rung during the day and an excellent curry in the evening.

The Society entered a band for the National 12 bell striking competition and after successfully competing in the eliminator at Melbourne were placed third in the final at Surfleet in June.

Roadshow

The Society took a stand at the roadshow held in Lincoln on 26th July. This was an excellent day and well over 300 people visited the stand. Drinks, a quiz to encourage people to look at the exhibits and badges advertising that "I have visited the SRCY stand" meant that a constant stream of people were attracted to find out more about the society. The Society is grateful to Linda Garton and George Brown for all their hard work on this project.

Peal Ringing

235 peals were rung during the year and 1 peal was rung in 2001/2 and reported during the current year.

Sunday Service Ringing

We are grateful to all members who support the Society's Sunday service ringing.

A number of members are part of the local band at St. Martin-in-the-Fields and ring regularly on Sunday mornings.

On 2nd July a special meeting was held to consider the provision of Sunday Service Ringing at Shoreditch. With people moving out of London and the change of the time of the service at St Martin-in-the-Fields, the logistics of providing ringers has become increasingly difficult. It was agreed that the Officers would arrange ringing on one Sunday a month in the months when Derek Sibson was not arranging peals. The position to be reviewed in the May meeting. The officers would also look for someone willing to act as organiser for Shoreditch Sunday Service ringing. The Society is grateful to Derek Sibson for the organising of his peal bands to cover this commitment.

Towers

Regular Society practices continue to be held at St Martin-in-the-Fields, usually on the first Wednesday of each month and we have returned to Shoreditch on a regular basis for practices after a break between November and July when the work on the bells was in progress,

The steps at Shoreditch have now been renovated all the way up to the ringing chamber.

The restoration work at Spitalfields Church continues. The bells are currently out of action and are likely to remain so until 2004.

Though, since it is a Guild Church, there are usually no Sunday services at St Andrews, Holborn, the Society is from time to time asked to provide ringing for weekday occasions.

Newsletter

This year the newsletter has again been published on the website as well as being sent out to every member. Some members received the newsletter via email (by request).

Christmas Cards and OLP prints

Due to a financial contribution from the family of the original artist, a small reprint of the prints was done. Christmas Cards were also sold with proceeds going towards the Bell Restoration Fund (shared by the College Youths). Income during the year for cards and prints amounted to £1,126.00. The Society would like to acknowledge the work done by Alan Regin and David Hilling on this project.

Library

The process of transferring many of the Society's oldest documents to the London Guildhall Library has continued throughout 2002/03. At the time of writing the Society has 11 documents on indefinite loan at this location. This includes:

- Three Name Books covering the period 1747 1999
- The 1747–1828 Peal Book and the 250th Anniversary Year Peal Book
- Four Minute Books covering the period 1887-1989 (with the exception of years 1899-1901)

Repair work to these documents has taken place where necessary, and scanned copies of several of these items have been produced by Derek Sibson to be placed in the ringing room at St Martin-in-the-Fields. The copy peal books are in the process of being transferred to the Master's house until such time as a permanent home that guarantees safe secure storage and access when required is found.

No items have been borrowed; 2 items have been added; 1 outstanding item has been returned. Details of items held in the library can be found on the website.

This is the last report that will be filed by pasting into a book. From the next meeting, minutes will be stored to be bound on a regular basis.

Peal board at Grace Church, Charleston

The peal board in the photograph was made to record the second peal on the new bells at St Mary's Enfield. You may know that the old bells, they were quite a tough ring in fact, were removed and shipped to Charleston South Carolina where they are now hung in the new tower of Grace Church - they go very well indeed here and have subsequently been augmented to 10. No prizes for guessing why the method was chosen!

The transfer of the bells resulted from an enormous amount of work undertaken by Dan Beaman, a member of this Society, and we were very pleased to be able to add the footnote recording his great work.

The board now hangs in the belfry following its dedication at the morning service at St Mary's on Sunday 27th July 2003. The board was made by Maggie Willans from Bath and we are very grateful for her skill and craftsmanship in making it.

Everyone seemed to be well satisfied with their efforts and especially grateful for the provision of the fans.

Our plan was to forego most of the afternoon ringing so that we could get some lunch and also return to the B&B to shower and change. On early arrival at Belper we were stood listening to wedding ringing that preceded the meeting ringing when another couple of ringers from the Ripley band arrived. One of them asked Donald "Were you in a peal this morning?" to which the reply "Yes, I called the peal that you were in" could not be resisted.

After a quick ring of Stedman Triples at Belper, we made a sharp exit from the Ringing Chamber in order to make room for the masses that were arriving. This also enabled us to grab a cup of tea and enjoy the wonderful array of cakes laid out in the church below.

After a very relaxing refreshment period it was then into the main body of the church for the business meeting. The meeting progressed quickly and smoothly with no matters causing undue argument or controversy. I would like to thank everyone for their support and encouragement. I think the northern representation at the excellent Dinner in Cambridge shows how active we are and how the SRCY has strong support far beyond the bounds of Greater London.

Cumberland Bob Major

On Saturday May 12th 1753 eight members of the Cumberland Youths met at Shoreditch to attempt a peal of Cumberland Bob Major, a method composed by the conductor of the peal (and in fact the conductor of all but one Cumberland Youths' peal to that date) George Partrick. They were successful and the detail of that peal is as follows:

The first lead of the method is shown in the peal book and the place notation is as follows: -18-16-58-18-18-18-12.

As you can see, it is an asymmetric method similar to Eastern Bob which was rung by the Eastern Scholars at Shoreditch a short time before the Cumberland Bob was rung.

One interesting thing was that the method could not be found in any Central Council list but I am gladto say that has now been put right!

A number of members came together to celebrate the 250th anniversary on or aroundthe anniversary date and eight peals were successful. These were rung at Fairwarp, Grundisburgh, Grayshott, Shoreditch, St Martin le Grand York, St Andrews Holborn, Aldgate and a handbell peal in Maidenhead. More recently one was rung at Turramurra, New South Wales. The handbell peal was certainly the first in the methodon handbells!

Apart from the list, there were also unsuccessful attempts at Great Hampton and at Belper and the attempt planned for Pinhoe was cancelled at short notice due to the indisposition of one of the band.

Don Morrison kindly provided a number of compositions and these were widely rung on the day. Additionally, Stephen Pettman came up with a 5250 which was rung at Grundisburgh. The Turramurra peal mentioned was also an unusual length, 5050. More about that can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

A very big thank you to all those that arranged the peals and to all of those who took part.

SRCY USA Tour 2002

This was our first experience of a SRCY tour arranged by Alan. We were kept very well informed up to the start of our great adventure and in less than no time it was departure day. Wednesday 27th November saw us at Gatwick South Terminal where we were to meet Cath Merlane. Advised by a cleaning lady that people were usually picked up in "the tunnel" we made our way down to the bowels of the airport. This did not seem right as we were confronted by police cars with sirens blaring, Out of them several policemen, armed with machine guns suddenly emerged. Returning to the departure lounge, we eventually met up with our host for the tour, thinking things could surely only get better.

Next morning we knew we were in the right place because we met up with several of the party and boarded the plane for Atlanta. Whilst on board we had plenty of time to digest the information given us by Alan in the Tour Schedule. If we thought this morning had been an early start we were aghast to discover that on Wednesday 4th December we would be leaving Houston at 04:00. We then checked that Alan was using the 24 hour clock as we didn't think that 4 in the morning existed!

Arriving in Atlanta, we took a connecting flight to Miami. Here we only had time to reach our hotel and have a meal before retiring. The next morning the peal band rang at the Cathedral and then it was back to the vehicles for a swift return to the airport and on to Houston.

Although we spent five nights here, the schedule was quite demanding with two peals each day, one at each tower; apart from Sunday when service ringing in the morning only left time for one peal in the afternoon. We were, however, privileged to ring the first peal on the new bells at St. Paul's Church, a peal which included two local Houston ringers.

The dreaded 04:00 start arrived and a bleary eyed group of ringers flew via Dallas to Little Rock and a peal at the Cathedral. Ron and I, not being involved in the peal, set off to explore the area. The sidewalk was difficult to negotiate and at one point degenerated into thick red quicksand in which I left my shoe. Ron, being a perfect gentleman, managed to retrieve it but was then covered in red mud.

From here we drove to Texarkana where we were met by the local ringers who had arranged accommodation for us and provided us with a welcome repast before the next peal attempt. Afterthe peal we went to Remica's house where we celebrated Paul Curtis's very significant birthday before beingtaken to our respective accommodation. Ron and I stayed with Martha Nell & Mark Richards. Mark was the personification of a typical Texan male, complete with very large hat!

On Friday we had another early start and travelled to Charleston via Little Rock where another peal was rung. I was particularly looking forward to this part of the trip, having heard so much about Charleston and having met the ringers when they visited England. Ron had said the weather would be very warm and advised against packing a sweater. He was wrong as they were having their coldest spell of weather on record for that time of year. One of the locals even went so far as to suggest he bought me a mink coat. The response cannot be printed here. Despite the weather, we had a very warm welcome from the local ringers and enjoyed the old world charm of this lovely city.

After four days in Charleston we drove to Hendersonville which was reported as being even colder. Although we only had one day here the town made a lasting impression. The main street had sometruly amazing shops: one, Mast General, sold everything from a clothes peg to a suede coat and the barrels of old fashioned sweets had to be seen to be believed. The assistants were very friendly and enquired as to our reason for being in Hendersonville. When I said we were bell-ringers they asked if we were being paid to come and ring. They were astounded that we should travel so far to ring their bells.

Later the same day we drove to Marietta, meeting at the church from where we were taken to the homes of our hosts for the next few days. We stayed with Chris & Cathy Brown whose son Matt wasto ringhis first peal of Superlative with the band during our stay. The next four days followed a pattern with peals at Marietta in the morning and afternoons in Atlanta. Another first peal at Marietta provided one of the memorable comments of the tour for me, when Haley Barnett, who had just rung her first peal of

Cambridge Surprise Major and knowing I was nervous about ringing with the band that afternoon, said "Don't worry: they'll tell you where to go"!

Other memories of our time in Marietta include the freight trains, hundreds of trucks pulled by one or more diesel units which ran all day and all night and which because of the un-protected crossings were continually blowing their horns, and the magnificent Christmas displays outside almost every house.

Overall, it was a special experience for us. The enthusiasm and hospitality of the Americans was overwhelming. The organisation, both before leaving England and during the tour, was excellent. Thirty-one peals were rung, 9 involving local ringers, 3 quarter peals, all including local ringers, 11 practice sessions with local ringers in Miami, Houston, Texarkana, Charleston, Stella Maris, Hendersonville, Marietta and Atlanta and 8 service ringing sessions with local ringers. It remains an unforgettable time with happy memories of people and places visited but also one which Ron light-heartedly suggests should come with a government health warning. Thanks must go to Alan for a brilliant piece of organisation and to all the band for their camaraderie and support. They are wonderful ambassadors for the exercise of ringing.

Thomas Card's Kent & Sussex band started the year well but then seemed to drop away although Card himself popped up in some of the peals later in the year, conducting one of Superlative S Major. That seems to have been a very popular method at the time, 7 being rung during the year, a lot of them conducted by James Parker of Edmonton who, incidentally, was the father of Edith Parker who called the first ladies' peal at Cubitt Town in 1912. Some interesting towers were popping up. There was a rare peal on the old ten at Bermondsey. Those bells are now, of course, in Toronto Cathedral. There was one at Walworth earlier in the year. Those bells are now at Limehouse and seem more suited there then in the very small tower at Walworth - there were in fact 99 peals rung on those bells before their transfer so they couldn't have gone too badly! St Luke's Chelsea was the venue of two peals in quick succession later in the year, I guess they went better in those days!

The peal of Superlative at Edmonton on 5th November appears to be the first for the Society for John D Matthews who went on to became Master of the Society.

Christ Church, Spitalfields

Very little to report at present as the Church has been closed for some months while the internal restoration is completed. This work is scheduled to be completed in May 2004 with the re-opening of the Church happening at some point after that. As a safety precaution the bell ropes were removed prior to the commencement of the work and I understand that the ringing Chamber is currently being used to store building materials.

We are aiming to get a some of work done to the clappers to some of the bells ready for the opening and also to arrange for a working party to assist with the re - painting of the bell frame, it is now over 30 years since the bells were installed and while the frame is not in bad condition it is about time that it was re-painted. Any volunteers, let me know!

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Shoreditch projects

Extensive work has been undertaken during the year on the bell frame and fittings at Shoreditch. This was to deal with the fact that the frame needed to be made more secure, and the go of some of the bells was not as it should be. Hayward Mills Associates undertook the work. The work done to the frame was quite substantial. The fixings around the foundation beams were broken out and concreted back in. A set of steel beams was fixed to the tower walls about two thirds of the way up the side of the frame, and the frame anchored to it to prevent it from moving. Other work was done to improve the roping and to adjust the swingtime of the bells so that they can be more easily rung together as a twelve. The rope circle was also changed so that it is now much closer to being circular, rather than in the shape of the letter D.

The bells are much improved on how they were before, and should provide a secure foundation from which to start the project to improve the acoustics of the bells.

Another Shoreditch project which came to fruition during the year was to make the steps safe. The top half of the steps, from the clock room up to the ringing chamber, had already had wooden covers fitted during 1999. We first of all looked into whether the remaining steps, from ground floor to clock room, could be repaired with concrete based material, on the grounds that this would be a more permanent means of repairing them. Architectural considerations did not however permit this. A decision was therefore made to cover the remainder of the steps in wood, and the work was completed in March 2003.

The cost of these two projects has depleted the Society's funds by about £29,000. The Society is endeavouring to restore at least some of these funds. If any member would be able to make a contribution, the Society would be very grateful. Please tick in the appropriate box on the reply sheet.

Peals Analysis

This year there has been a decrease in the number of peals rung between 1/8/02 and 31/7/03, 235 compared with 268 last year. This time there were only 2 (4) handbell peals in that total. The number of towers was slightly less with 169 (184). Once again Shoreditch is back as the leading tower andthis year there are still three from the U.S.A. in the top ten. One of these, the United Methodist Church of St. Paul in Houston was a new ring and the first four peals on the bells are in the total.

<u>Towers:</u> Shoreditch 14 (18), Spitalfields 5 (10), Trumpington 5 (9), St. Sepulchre's 5 (5), Barton Seagrave 5 (5), Houston United Methodist 4 (0), St. Martin-in-the-Fields 4 (3), Atlanta 3 (2), Texarkana 3 (4), St. Mary-le-Bow 3 (3), Fairwarp 3 (1), 24 towers with 2 and 134 with just 1.

Geographically the peals were even more widespread, being rung in 41 different counties in the British Isles, 25 in 7 states in the U.S.A. and 3 in Australia. Most were rung in London 48 (53), followed this time by Derbyshire 18 (0), Cambridgeshire 12 (17), Kent 8 (29), Sussex 8 (8) and Northants 7 (11). The change in distribution each year once again is a reflection of where we hold country meetings and special ringing days.

348 (309) members took part and 169 (141) rang in only one peal.

<u>Ringers:</u> Alan Regin 86 (91), Derek E. Sibson 70 (95), E. Jane Sibson 67 (92), Michael H. D. O'Callaghan 58 (53), Ian R. Fielding 54 (41), Simon J. Davies 53 (83), Ian G. Campbell 51 (59), Paul Curtis 49 (48), Ruth Curtis 49 (48), Stephen A. Wheeler 49 (66).

The conducting was shared by 49 people this year compared with 47 last year. Derek E. Sibson 63 (83), Stephen A. Wheeler 36 (43), Ian R. Fielding 31 (22), John P. Loveless 17 (25), Ian Roulstone 8 (12), James W. Belshaw 6 (13), Paul F. Curtis 6 (4), Roger Baldwin 5 (11) and Matthew Durham 4 (1).


The variety of methods has once again fallen following last year's increase. 101 (120) different methods or groups of methods (e.g. 4-Spliced) were rung and it is pleasing to see a marked increase in 12-bell peals after last year, not just due to the return of the availability of Shoreditch.
