Ed Mack remembers the **2017 National 12 Bell Competition**



Here is what I remember about the 2017 National 12 Bell contest.

At the eliminators in March we were placed second. The top 3 go

through, so this was OK. Southwark Cathedral was the venue for the final. I remembered these bells as being rather difficult to ring and our practices there as being, well, not our best. So it ought to have been good news that the bells had been overhauled in 2016. Except that as each team went for their practices in May and June, there seemed to be a new set of horror stories about the bells. I even heard reports that one team struggled to ring rounds. The condition of the Southwark bells dominated pub talk for some time.

Sadly on 3rd of June there was an attack on London Bridge (just a stone's throw from Southwark Cathedral) where 7 people lost their lives. As a result we were unable to arrange a practice until the Wednesday before the Final. It was good to finally get there, but I remember not feeling very optimistic.

Our practice was really promising however. It seemed to me that the horror stories about the bells had been exaggerated (unless you were on the 10, 11, or 12, but that wasn't me, so that was ok...!).

On the day of the Final we were drawn third out of ten teams. This kind of slot is usually considered quite desirable for drinking. I think our team rang some of (if not the) best ringing of the day. Sadly our last lead was poor, and in the end we were placed fourth.

After the ringing (but not before) we found that there was lots of good beer and cider to be drunk. It was a very good day out, and I particularly enjoyed a tipsy visit to Pizza Express! The Southwark band put on an excellent day for us all and, challenging though the bells are, they were enjoyable and rewarding to ring.

When the results were announced, we learnt that we had the slowest peal speed of the day at 4h 10. The comments from the judges were short on detail, but they said that we 'took time to settle but once did, excellent. Lost energy towards the end'.

Our 2017 eliminator was at St Margaret, Leicester where we came

second behind Bristol (82%) with a mark of 80%. In the final at Southwark Cathedral on 24 June, which was won by Birmingham (75%), we were fourth with 70% (more at page 4).



In 2018 our eliminator was at Selby Abbey. We came third with a mark of

80%. At the final at Cambridge on 23 June we again scored 80%, coming fourth equal. The winners were Birmingham who scored 90%.




show, which allowed some of our older models to steal the limelight. A handbell peal attempt was completed late on Saturday evening, bringing the total to 12.

Peal weekend is the third weekend in November. In 2017, 45 peals were arranged, 29 scored and 240 members took part. Claire Roulstone rang the most peals (4) and Ian Fielding was the leading conductor (3). In 2018 (17-18 November) 40 peals were arranged, 31 were scored and 208 members took part. Alan Regin and Ian Campbell rang the most peals (5 each) and Ian Fielding and Matthew Durham were the leading conductors (2 each). Thanks again to John Barnes for co-ordinating these events.

Peals analysis 2017-18 (last year's figures in brackets)

This year has seen a further drop in the number of peals rung. Between 1/8/17 and 31/7/18 there were 126 compared with 136 last year, which is a fall of 7.4%. There are 9 (14) handbell peals in that total which is



also a drop. The number of towers was slightly lower with 96(103). Shoreditch is still the leading tower with 11 (7).

<u>Towers</u>: Shoreditch 12 (7), Basingstoke (All Saints) 6 (5), Holybourne 4 (2), Barton Seagrave 3 (1), 4 (6) towers all had 2 and there were 87 (91) with just 1. 6 (10) of the handbell peals were rung at Harford Drive but none was rung abroad this year.

Geographically the peals were more widespread in the UK. In the British Isles peals were rung in 30 (30) different counties but there were none in Ireland or abroad. In the UK most were rung in Greater London 25 (25), followed by Hampshire 16 (9), Worcestershire 11 (0), Hertfordshire 8 (15), Dorset 6 (1), Kent 6 (3), Surrey 6(4) and Norfolk 5(4). Several counties had 4 and 3 but there were still a number of counties with none.

This year the number of members taking part in peals is again slightly less at 225 (246). 118 (116) rang in only one peal. There has been a change in the leader with David Bath on 37.

Ringers: David Bath 37 (10), Ben Constant 36 (23), Adam Greenley 36 (23), Claire Roulstone 34 (23), Alan Regin 31 (38), Felicity Warwick 28 (13), David Warwick 27 (15), Ian Roulstone 26 (15), Shirley McGill 26 (27), Jack Page 21 (10) and Daniel Page 21 (4).

The conducting was shared by 40 (42) people this year. Jack Page 15 (3), Ian Roulstone 14 (12), David Warwick 11 (8), Richard Hobbs 9 (6), Ian Fielding 7 (8), Roger Baldwin 6 (13), Ben Constant 6 (7), Graham Duke 6 (2), John Loveless 6 (2), Paul Curtis 3 (7), Andrew Gordon 3 (0), Peter Waterfield 3 (19), 9 (9) members with 2 and 19 (21) with 1. The members conducting peals changes from year to year and it is good to see several new names among them this year.

The variety of methods has risen slightly. 67 (56) different methods or groups of methods (e.g. 4-Spliced) were rung. The number of 12-bell peals has increased with 16 (10) of maximus, 1 (0) of cinques and maximus and 1 (5) of cinques. Still only 2 (1) peals of maximus was rung at Shoreditch, and the remainder are spread between 11 (6) towers. This year there are 2 (0) peals of 23-spliced S. Major.

Maximus 16 (10), Cinques and Maximus 1 (0), Cinques 1 (5), Royal 22 (22), Caters 0 (0), Major 71 (72), Triples 1 (0), Minor 13 (26), and Doubles 1 (0). This year Bristol Surprise Major heads the list.

Methods: Bristol S. Major 10 (13), London S. Major 7 (9), Bristol S Maximus 6 (3), London No.3 S. Royal 6 (4), 4-Spliced S Major 5 (3), 7-Surprise Minor 4 (14), 8-Spliced S. Major 4 (9), Superlative S. Major 4 (1), Yorkshire S. Major 3 (5), Glasgow S. Major 3 (2).

This year there are 7 (5) peals of Spliced Maximus from 3 to 6 methods.

To update the personal totals for the Society of those who have rung over 500, the list is as follows: Alan Regin 2144, Derek Sibson 1777, Simon Davies 1309, Jane Sibson 1213, Ian Fielding 1181, Graham Duke 1131, Ian Campbell 1119, Richard Hobbs 1016, John Loveless 987, Shirley McGill 879, Linda Garton 826, Catherine Merlane 800, Stephen Wheeler 762, Michael O'Callaghan 730, Peter Fleckney 713, Paul Cammiade 699, Roger Baldwin 608, Paul Curtis 599, Ruth Curtis 573, Frank Rivett 520, Russell Brown 512 and Jo Dorling 502. Jo Dorling is the only addition to the list this year. These figures are for peals published in the Ringing World and appearing on Peals.co.uk up to September 30th and are therefore by definition out of date by the time you read this!

In methods, those with more than 100 for the Society since the computer records began in 1934 change very little with only a few changes in order. There are no additions but one or two methods are getting near 100. Bristol S. Major 670, 4-Spliced S. Major 274, 8-Spliced S. Major 262, 7 methods S. Minor 260, London S. Major 259, Yorkshire S. Major 240, Bristol S. Maximus 209, Yorkshire S. Maximus 178, Bristol S. Royal 168, Stedman Cinques 166, London No.3 S. Royal 164, Yorkshire S. Royal 156, Cambridge S. Major 139, Cambridge S. Royal 131, Rutland S. Major 121 and 23-Spliced S. Major 106.

There are only two towers with more than 100 peals. Not surprisingly they are Shoreditch with 880 and Spitalfields with 202. Once again no additions but St. Martin's is getting close.



Stockton on Tees

We have not rung all twelve on a Sunday morning for some months, and there have been a few Sunday mornings recently when we have only had six or seven ringers. We have also struggled for numbers with practices, and in September this year took the decision to change from weekly to monthly practices, with the possibility of arranging quarter peals on request.



In spite of this, there have been some notable events and achievements during the year. Not least among these was the celebration of John Barnes' 70 years as a ringer held on Sunday 14 January 2018. A quarter peal of Spliced Cambridge and Double Bob Maximus was rung in John's honour by members of the St Martin-in-the-Fields band, and this was followed by a celebration lunch. A past master of the SRCY, John has been a member of the St Martin-in-the-Fields band for 27 years, and continues to show a dedication and commitment to Sunday service ringing second to none. I am sure you will all join me wholeheartedly in congratulating John on reaching such an impressive milestone, and in thanking him for all he has given and continues to give, both to St Martin's and the SRCY, and to ringing in general.

Other notable events during the year included a special Eucharist on Pentecost Sunday, which was broadcast live from St Martin's by the BBC, with some of the ringing being recorded and used as the soundtrack for the opening credits. On Saturday 29th September band members and friends rang a peal of Stedman Cinques. This was conducted by Lucy Woodward and, among other firsts, was Geoff Foster's first of Stedman Cinques. It was also a compliment to John Barnes for his 70 years of ringing.

We were unfortunately not able to enter either the National or the London 12 bell competitions this year due to lack of numbers.

The planned outing in September, kindly organised by Vice Captain Tim Forster, unfortunately had to be cancelled due to transport issues and low numbers.

On Sunday 11 November we rang three times, half muffled in memory of the fallen before the morning service, open at 12.30pm in celebration of the centenary of the Armistice, and open again in the evening for the annual patronal festival service.

Looking forward to the remainder of the year, we will be ringing for a memorial service for Victims of Homicide in December, as well as the usual extra ringing for Christmas services.


Paul Turp (Honorary Member)

MY (SMALL) PART IN THE YPRES BELLS PROJECT

My maternal grandfather, George Henry Hutchinson, was killed in action in WW1 on July 30th 1917, near Ypres in Belgium. He was born in Nottingham in early 1886, the second eldest of four children, and with his father worked in the famous Lace Market.

He joined up to 'Kitchener's Third New Army' in September 1914 as a member of the 25th division - only a couple of months after the declaration of war. They assembled and trained in the area around Salisbury and landed in France in late September 1915. George was in the Royal

Field Artillery (RFA), and saw action at Vimy Ridge, the Somme, Thiepval and the battles of Barzentin, Poziere and the Ancre Heights, before he was killed, most likely by German counter-battery fire, just before the start of the 3rd battle of Ypres. He is buried in the Perth Cemetery a few miles south of Ypres.

As a ringer I was therefore very pleased to hear from Alan Regin about the proposal to install a ring of bells in the Anglican Church of St George in Ypres as a commemoration of all those who lost their lives in the

Great War. The trustees of the project had decided that the best way to finance the scheme was to solicit up to 100 donations of £3,000, with each donor being given the opportunity to have the name of a family member inscribed on one of

the bells. I was therefore, with the help of my family, able to ensure that my grandfather would be

remembered on one of the bells. With so much interest in the scheme it did not take long for the money to be raised and so on Thursday 27th April last year we were invited to see the casting of the 4th bell at the Loughborough Foundry of John Taylor & Co.

Last July was the centenary of the death of my grandfather, so I arranged a long weekend in Ypres for a group of 14 family members spanning three generations. We spent some time at my grandfather's graveside and visited other cemeteries and memorial sites around Ypres, among them Hills 60 and 62 which both saw many months of fighting. We also attended the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate on the Saturday. Soon after returning from that trip, I was pleased to be



able to see the bells on display at the Great Dorset Steam Fair. This annual event has included an area dedicated to commemorating the Great War since the 2014 event, including a re-creation of the WWI trenches. The display of the Ypres bells fitted into this theme very well. It was my first opportunity to view the finished bells and read the inscriptions for myself. I thought that Alan Regin and his helpers did a fantastic job of explaining to many, many visitors the significance of the bells and their inscriptions, and the planned route they would take on their way to Ypres on two vintage WW1 lorries. I was so happy that I was able to see 'Grandad's bell' so close to my present home.

It did not seem to be long before the bells were hung and ready for the



dedication ceremony in late October. Rosemary and I were able to travel with a party arranged by Derek



Sibson. This was a wonderful occasion with over 200 people, mostly UK ringers, attending, and the church was packed. As reported in the Ringing World of 3 November 2017, everything about the project has been completed to the highest standard and the bells are a delight to ring. The Ringing Room panelling is especially splendid. I was honoured

to be asked to ring in the first touch after the service, a course of Ypres Surprise Major. We had a practice the day before to ensure all was well, while a BBC

East Midlands team did some recording both in the Ringing Chamber and the Belfry, the access to which is through a small trap-door which was open most of the time! The post-service touch with a few non-ringing dignitaries in attendance in the small Ringing Chamber was rather unnerving, but in the circumstances was rung well.

I was again honoured to be invited to take part in the first peal on the bells, also of Ypres Surprise, on 10 January 2018. Despite the pressure, an excellent peal was scored.

Penny Sharpe talks to **Alan Regin MBE**

Early Influences Alan learned to ring at Ottershaw, Surrey, on a heavy 16½ cwt six. He was introduced to ringing by his brother Jack who was already a ringer. At his first lesson, Alan was fascinated by the fact that just by pulling a rope you could set a weighty bell spinning and turning. Coming into contact with two other young brothers, he was also drawn by the fact that ringers came from such a range of backgrounds and ages, from their teens to their 80s and 90s: meeting many older people other than parents broadened the horizons of a budding ringer. Everybody getting together and just enjoying ringing was an inspiration.

Early on Alan met Tom Page at a local practice. Tom noticed Alan and straightened out his handling. Alan left London at 16 for his first job at Loughborough bell foundry. But after a few months he decided to head to London for work, where he would find more advanced ringing. In those early days he rang heaps of QPs, conducting many. He rang with a group on Saturdays, often ringing six quarter peals in a day. Living in Alperton, he joined the local band at Bushey. There he met some amazing ringers including Roger and Kath Baldwin and Christopher Woolley. Roger in particular was to become a great influence, introducing him to the world of peal ringing.

Alan then went to work for the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea and thus started to attend Kensington. Here he met such people as Stephanie Pattenden and Jim Belshaw who were also to have a significant impact on his ringing development.



SRCY Membership In those early days in London, Alan attended the practices of SRCY and ASCY. Feeling more at home with the Cumberlands, he joined the Society in January 1983. A year later he was Junior Steward, and in 1987 he became Master. A highlight of this first stint as Master was in 1989, when the Society won the National 12 bell competition for the first time at Redcliffe.

Peal Ringing At this point in the 80s, Alan had already started organising peals in London and further afield, ranging from midweek peals of spliced surprise major to 12 bell peals. He also started to organise ringing tours. It was not just ringing though; from the late 80s Alan led tours that involved no ringing, to such places as Moscow, Albania, and China.

In 1988 he was involved in the first of the big overseas tour to Australia and New Zealand with David Brown, and other members of the St James's Guild. Then to the USA in 1992, with many other US and Canada tours following (he has rung 473 peals in the US to date), many of the North American tours being SRCY tours. Then in 1995 was the first big tour to South Africa and Zimbabwe, again with the St James's Guild.

Alan's second stint as SRCY master covered the 250th Anniversary in 1997, which we celebrated with peal attempts at every cathedral, and that fantastic dinner at Middle Temple Hall. The Society also won the National 12 Bell Competition again that year. These were heady days for the Society. The aim was to ring 250 peals, and we ended up ringing between 400 and 500. Alan arranged many special peal days too, with historical themes, or just for the challenge: such as the 250th anniversary of the first peal of Bob Major, a 23 Spliced day, and a Pitman's day, involving many members from near and far.

Alan is a very proud member of the Society as demonstrated by his commitment and service to the Society over many years. I asked him what it is about peal ringing that drives him to be one of the leading peal ringers in the world. He said it's the satisfaction and happiness you get from achieving the best ringing you can, the travelling, and meeting different people in in different places.

Alan is a very gregarious ringer, having rung at least one peal with 1818 different people, over 100 peals with 81 people, over 1000 peals with five people, and over 2250 with Ian Campbell.

Rolls of Honour Alan's interest in the history of ringers who died in combat was sparked at Bushey, where there were photos of two ringers, Bertram Prewett and Robert Stavert. who had been killed in World War I. He visited their graves in France in the mid 80s, and as time went on he looked them up in the Central Council's Rolls of Honour at St Paul's Cathedral. These hand written books, dating from 1921, contained a list of 1150 names with the tower and guild of each ringer. Alan wanted to find out more, starting with where they were buried or commemorated. Bit by bit he photographed each page, and listed the names in a spreadsheet gathering more information on each ringer as time went by.

He started to find people who were not in the first book, and this led to a second book. Alan managed to raise £4000 from ringers to produce this second book, which, like the first, was hand written and bound in leather vellum. He was also building an archive of information about the ringers; the idea was to collect as much information as possible, as well as where and how they lived and died, their parents, marriages and children.

Alan has been working on this for over 15 years, and 11 years ago he became Steward of the Rolls of Honour. He has now gathered information for all but 30 names, and there are now over 1500 names recorded.

Great War Centenary and Ypres
Alan wanted to complete his work on
the Rolls of Honour for the centenary
of the Great War in 2018. Taking early
retirement, and with the assistance of
four family history helpers, he got all
the information he had collected
together and had it published in the
Ringing World. The information will
in time be added to the Central Council

Roll of Honour web page, for all to see.

Alan has visited many war graves and memorials throughout Europe, including St George's Memorial Church in Ypres, which had a bell tower! So the Ypres project was launched to install a ring of bells in the tower, with the aim of completion by the end of the centenary year; but the fundraising was so successful that that by 22 October 2017, the bells were being dedicated.

All the bells are memorials to the Great War, remembering individuals, as well as groups such as Harrow School for the tenor and ANZAC for the seventh. The whole installation has been completed to a very fine standard, a Rolls Royce job to complement the wonderful new ring of bells.

It is not just ringing but the honouring of fallen ringers which brings people together. Alan received a call the other day from London, Ontario, Canada, from Robert Stavert's grandson, who did not know

that his grandfather had been a ringer. He had visited his grave in France in August 2018 and wrote his name, as a grandson, on a British Legion cross which he left on the grave. He had also put his name and town in the visitors' book at the cemetery. Alan discovered the cross, and was able to contact the grandson, who sent a message of appreciation to the band after a centenary peal was rung for Bertram Prewett and Robert Stavert, at Bushey in November 2018.

Ringing Remembers Alan came up with the idea of Ringing Remembers as a result of his work on the Rolls of Honour. As 1400 ringers were (at that time) recorded in the Rolls of Honour, the idea was to recruit 1400 new ringers to replace those lost. This was taken on board by ringers around the world and over 2000 new ringers have now been trained.

MBE We Cumberlands are very proud of Alan's achievements and services to ringing, which were recognised by the award of an MBE in the New Year's Honours in 2018. Alan is very grateful to Ian Campbell, who nominated him, and the many people who supported his nomination. We were able to help Alan celebrate with champagne at our January meeting in London, and he brought the medal along to our March meeting just days after receiving it from Prince Charles at Buckingham Palace.

What next? There is an opportunity for a new ring of bells in France, with towers being considered. Alan says - watch this space. *Penny Sharpe*
